You are most likely reading this during the season of Christmas. In our church heritage, the days between December 25th and January 6th are considered Christmas; we remember it in song with the 12 days of Christmas. This ends on January 6th with Epiphany. We often commemorate Epiphany Sunday with the story of the magi in Matthew's gospel. Epiphany is often the forgotten major holiday of the church. It falls so close to Christmas we often just breeze by it without really taking any extra time to explore what it means. The origin of the word comes from Greek and is simply "to reveal." Epiphany is the time when the divinity of Christ is revealed. This connects it nicely to the story of the magi, who come to worship the new king. In the Eastern church the narratives of Jesus' baptism and the wedding at Cana are also linked to this Sunday, each revealing in their own way the divinity of Christ. In our Western tradition these two scripture passages are often used in ensuing weeks, but not on Epiphany.

In Rome we have records of Epiphany being a separate celebration by the mid-Fourth Century, about the same time as the earliest mention of Christmas being on December 25th. We also know that Epiphany originated in the Eastern Church as a celebration of the birth of Christ, with Clement of Alexandria making note of it in the Third Century. In some orthodox traditions, the January 6th date is still a Christmas celebration, with Epiphany falling on January 17th.

Our normal practice at Otterbein is to

celebrate Epiphany on the Sunday before January 6th. Due to how the liturgical calendar works this year, that Sunday would be December 31st and seems a little abrupt. So, this Epiphany Sunday will also be the Baptism of the Lord; we will honor some of our Eastern Church practices and celebrate both on January 7th.

I write this still in the midst of Advent, with some expectant hope for a wonderful Christmas season. Many blessings as we celebrate this time together. Merry Christmas and may the light of Christ revealed during Epiphany guide you this coming year.

On December 7, 35 folks from Otterbein joined over 300 other people, including elected and corporate leaders, in committing to take the next steps in
