VIA News



On January 24, the Rockingham Board of Supervisors rejected (by a vote of 4 to 1) **VALLEY INTERFAITH ACTION** VIA's request for a letter of support for a

county-wide demand-response transit demonstration grant.

On February 5, VIA's Transit team met to evaluate our January 24 action and develop next steps. The team acknowledged our disappointment with the January 24 outcome, but also affirmed our resolve to address our county's transit needs by seeking to create a demand-response transit system. While VIA leaders continue to solicit corporate partners to fund a demonstration grant, the transit team established two focus areas:

- 1. VIA leaders needed to publicly address the unchallenged mischaracterizations that were expressed during the January 24 meeting. We did this through the local media. We also updated the FAQ document related to the Transit Initiative and posted it on VIA's website.
- Most importantly, VIA leaders and the transit team renewed our efforts to build solid public relationships with the four Supervisors who voted to deny the request (Hensley, Longcor, Chandler, and Wolfe-Garrison). We encountered some initial resistance, but through persistent action, we have made progress. VIA leaders have met with Supervisors Chandler, Longcor, and Wolfe-Garrison. Supervisor Hensley has committed to meet with VIA leaders. As we engage in these ongoing public relationships with the County Supervisors, we will continue to evaluate where we are in gaining the three votes necessary for a letter of support for a transit demonstration grant.

Our next assembly will be a Community Transit Briefing on Thursday, May 23, 6:30 - 8 pm at Massanutten Presbyterian

Much like Lent where we pause our fast on Sundays to have small glimpse of Easter, in Easter we are still impacted by the incomplete nature of the Kingdom of God. Even in Easter when we are surrounded by reminders of what God has done through Jesus Christ, there are still unknowns, uncertainty, and grief. We hold fast to the knowledge that God includes us in the promise of a day when all things will be made whole. Until that time we are comforted by knowing that amazing things have happened, are all around us, and will continue to come our way.

Hygiene Kit (Value: \$12 per kit) Toothpaste & Shipping Cost: \$2.00

- One hand towel (15 x 25 -17 x 27 inches; No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels)
- One washcloth (No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels)
- One comb (Must be sturdy with at least 4-7 inches of teeth. No pocket combs or picks. Rattail and combs without handles are acceptable but must have at least 4-7 inches of teeth.)
- One toenail or fingernail clipper (No emery boards or metal nail files)
- Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger; No Ivory or Jergen's soap. Do not remove from packaging.)
- One adult toothbrush (Do not remove from packaging. Personal advertising not acceptable.)
- 10 adhesive bandages (¾ by 3 inches; Common household bandages acceptable)
- One one-gallon size re-sealable bag
- *Do not add toothpaste when assembling kits

Assembly Instructions

Lay hand towel flat on a table. Lay the washcloth in the center of the hand towel. Place all remaining items on top of the washcloth (except the plastic bag). Fold the sides of the hand towel to cover the items. Grasp the bundle tightly and roll over the remainder of the towel. Place the tightly rolled bundle in the plastic bag, remove air, and seal.

Menstrual Hygiene Kit (Value: \$24.00 per kit) Shipping Cost: \$2.00

- One one-gallon size re-sealable bag
- Two 2 oz bottles hand sanitizer
- Three 4-gallon bathroom trash bags
- One travel pack of wet ones
- 10 tampons (5 regular and 5 super absorbency; unscented)
- 10 sanitary napkins (unscented, long super ultra-thin)
- Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger; No Ivory or Jergen's soap. Do not remove from packaging.)
- One pack of flushable wipes (42 count; unscented)
- Six laundry detergent sheets (Laundry detergent sheets should be placed inside of a small plastic storage bag prior to being added to the kit.)

Assembly Instructions

Start with a one-gallon resealable bag. Place one pack of the flushable wipes and wet ones in the bag. Place three 4-gallon bathroom trash bags and the 10 sanitary napkins in the bag. Then, add the smaller items in the plastic bag, remove air, and seal.

Important Notes

- All items must be new. Do not wash any of the items as they will no longer be considered new.
- Do not include any personal notes, money, or additional materials in the kits.
- Contents of kits or the containers of kits should not be imprinted with cartoon characters, advertisements, religious, patriotic, military, or camouflage symbols.

Did You Know?

CREATION CARE TASK FORCE

• Every second 160,000 plastic bags are used around the world. That

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adds up to approximately 5 trillion plastic bags every year, enough to orbit the Earth 7 times.

- Plastic shopping bags have a useful life of about 12 to 25 minutes, but it takes from 500 to 1,000 years for a bag to degrade, and plastic bags never fully break down. Instead the bags photo-degrade, becoming micro plastics that absorb toxins and continue to pollute the environment.
- Fossil fuels, a finite resource, and high amounts of electricity and water are required for manufacturing plastic bags, and their production causes harmful side effects to the environment.
- Light and airy, plastic bags are easily swept by the breeze and carried to our local streams which flow into the Shenandoah River, to the Chesapeake Bay, and finally to the Atlantic Ocean.
- Birds often mistake shredded plastic bags for food, filling their stomachs with hazardous material, and hungry turtles find it nearly impossible to distinguish between jellyfish and floating shopping bags. Fish eat thousands of tons of plastic each year transferring it up the food chain to larger fish and mammals. It is estimated that throughout the world, people consume the equivalent of a credit card of plastic each week.
- Chemical leachates from plastic bags impair the growth of the world's most important micro organisms, Prochlorococcus, a marine bacterium that provides one tenth of the world's oxygen.

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Kits for Conference

It's that time of year again when we collect items and put together United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) Kits. These are then sent to one of UMCOR's Supply Depots ready to be deployed to serve those most in need when disaster happens. We are collecting items for the Hygiene Kits and Menstrual Kits, as well as monetary donations for the Cleaning Kits (\$75). Lists of the items needed and directions for packing are on the next page and are available in the breezeway and the back of the sanctuary. A tub for your donations is in the breezeway.

Please have your donations in by May 28th.
